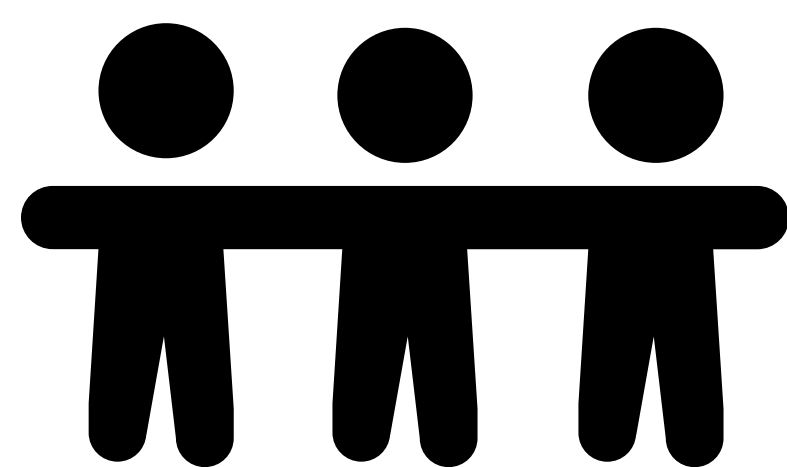

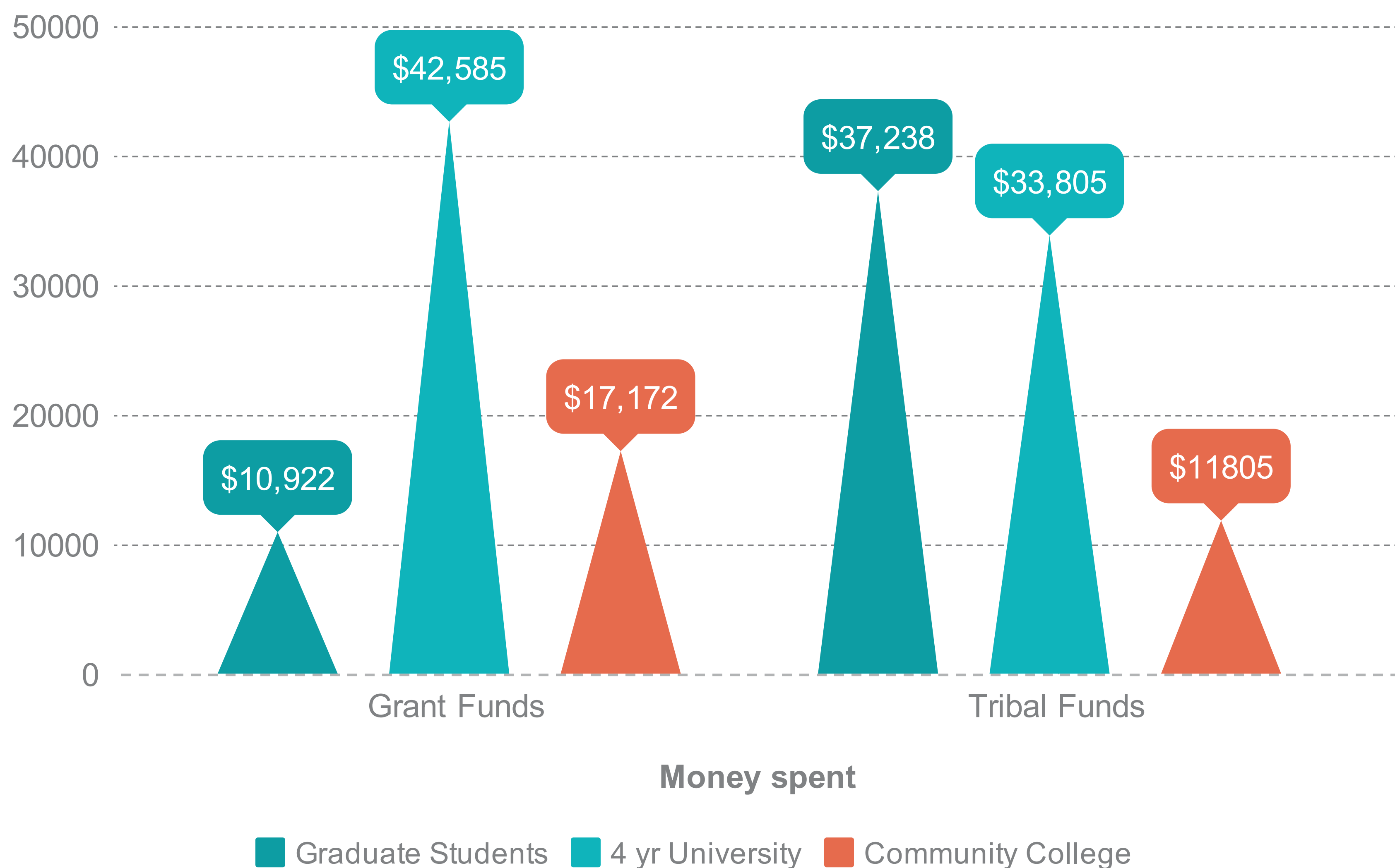

Boys & Girls Club of Bay Mills

- Total registered Club members ages 5-19 for Brimley, Bay Mills, and CAMP sites = **413**
- Bay Mills Tribal Members = **186**
- Native members, Other Tribal Affiliation = 60
- Other (Caucasian, Asian, African American, Other) = **167**

Bay Mills Child Development Center

- **Head Start (preschool age 3 & 4 year olds) is funded at 36 slots-currently full**
- **Early Head Start (infants and toddlers) is funded at 40 slots and is also full.**
- **BMCDC currently employs 22 people full-time and 2 part-time**

A total of 76 children, ages 0-5 are served by the program

Bay Mills Conservation- Fishing

- **A total of 74 tribal members operate as commercial fishers**
- 50 of those individuals hold a captain's license
- 24 of those fishers had a helper's license

Noteworthy accomplishments of 2018

- **Construction of a new public works building on Plantation Road**
- **Work began on the Tribal Action Plan to combat substance abuse**
- **Planning and site selection began for the new Bay Mills Health Center**
BMIC secured \$1.5 million from the State of Michigan for this project
- **Boys & Girls Club received \$2.6 million in grants to fund two new programs**

The first award, \$904,761, is a three-year ILEAD grant for Native Youth Initiative for Leadership, Empowerment, and Development, provided by the Dept. of Health and Human Services.

The second award, a four-year grant totaling \$1,752,980, is for a Native Youth Community Project, originating with the Department of Education's Office of Indian Education. With this funding the Club will be address several major barriers to youth achieving academic success, including generational trauma and transportation to and from Club programming.
